Partnered Reading	In Partnered Reading this week the children have been looking at three different books. We have allocated each book to the children on Bug Club so that the children can show you how much they have progressed in their reading throughout the week. Maths	In Maths this week, we have ben working on counting in groups of 2, 5 and 10. We have been making sure the groups are equal, before counting how many groups there are. We have used the STEM sentence: There are 3 groups of 2. There are 6 altogether. We have also splatted the numbers on our 50 grids and looked for patterns between them.					
English	In English this week, we learnt then wrote our own innovated poem of Mrs Sprockett's Strange Machine. The children were brilliant at finding rhyming words in order to write their own poems. We then introduce Mrs Armitage and her wonderful bike with lots of extra added features! We explored the vocabulary then began to learn the story. Phonics	In phonics, we have been recapping our phase 5 sounds. We have been paying special attention to notice them in different words and to work out which would be the most appropriate — e.g. whether the 'g' is making a /g/ or /j/ sound in the
