Reading riddles instructions sheet:


Our new library activity is riddles set by the Year Six librarians.

What to do:

rear 3&4- Match the riddles to the books on display in the S section and then fill in the inswer sheet. Once that is complete, put it in the answer pile and a librarian will check it for rou. Once you have worked out the riddles, read at least one of the books.

Year 5&6- Match the riddles to the books on display in the S+ section and then fill in the answer sheet. Once that is complete, put it in the answer pile and a librarian will check it for you. Once you have worked out riddles, read at least one of the books.

Here are a few new books I would recommend for a great summer read:




Meet Sunshine Simpson – a brand-new best friend for 9+ readers! Perfect for fans of Jacqueline Wilson.


Sunshine Simpson's larger-than-life Grandad is always telling her to get out and find her own adventures, but unfortunately BAD LUCK has a habit of coming her way.




This is a Barrington Stoke book making it dyslexia friendly. A great book for music lovers. Just as she's really beginning to make progress, Lacey's music teacher has to leave, which throws Lacey back into turmoil. Will she go back to her self-destructive ways, or will music offer her a way to save her from herself? Olly Brown is hamster obsessed, but he never gets to take home the Year 6 class hamster. His dad won't allow any pets. But then the most amazing thing happens: a hamster shows up in Olly's house anyway! And it seems smart. Like, really smart. This is one of the funniest books of the year. Suitable 7+





Danny Mack's mates are brilliant: there's his best mate Giraffles (yeh, you read that right), so-called because of his unusually long neck; the MandM twins (you got it - like the chocolate) who are always finishing each other's sentences; and Lucky Success, who, well I reckon you can guess how he got his name.

This is a must for anyone interested in the discoveries of Charles Darwin. We have recently acquired this book for the library, and I really loved the way the story linked to the true facts of Darwin's voyage. Shipwrecked on a Galapagos Island, Syms Covington makes a discovery that could change the world - and make his fortune. But should he share his find, or will it lead to the extinction of a legendary species?



Year three have been enjoying the classic story of the Iron Man by Ted Hughes. By request we have also got a copy of The Iron Woman in the library. Inspired by these stories Mrs Page has worked with some of the children to produce this amazing model. I really hope he takes up residence in the library!
