	We are continuing practising our handwriting weekly, focussing on letter size and orientation.
Reminder	It is so lovely to hear the children reading so confidently in school. Thank you to those parents hearing their children read daily as it really helps to develop fluency. We also love to read in the children's diaries what books you have been sharing at home.
Maths	In maths this week we have been focusing on composition. We have made squares using 4 cubes and 9 cubes, we discussed what we could see and what was different/ what was the same. At the end of the week, we enjoyed more practical activities focusing on composition of 9.
English	This week in English we have thought about if Jack would make a good friend and explained our reasons. We also thought about what makes a good friend. We have also enjoyed thinking about the giant, as a character. We wrote sentences to describe him.
